## UPMC Mercy Hospital School of Nursing UPDATE

Hello Alumni Friends,

I hope this newsletter finds you well. I am pleased to tell you that the school of nursing is doing well and continues to grow. In 2023, we saw a lot of positive changes to our school. We started a second admission class; students can now enter the program in both May and September. We doubled the September enrollment, admitting 134 students.

We brought back the tuition forgiveness program where students can receive help with their tuition while they are in the



program in exchange for a work commitment with UPMC post-graduation.

We graduated 75 students in 2023. Both graduations were held at Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall in Oakland. They were beautiful ceremonies where students received both their diploma and Mercy School of Nursing pin. We are proud to say that our NCLEX pass rate for 2023 was 89%. We continue to grow and change to meet the ever-changing needs of today's students and health care.



In 1959 as a high school graduate, God and my RN mother knew better than I, what I should do with my life. Those days, girls listened to their mothers, so I entered the Mercy Hospital School of Nursing, There were over 100 nursing students in my class, ultimately 100 of us graduated in 1959! We formed a 'sisterhood' because we needed one another to help us through clinicals.

The oftentimes sad, sometimes exciting, sometimes depressing experiences I had often led me to the (pay) phone to tell my mom I was coming home, because this was SO hard. By age 19, I had delivered a baby (just me and the mom) and had patients die in my arms!

My parents always made sure I was back at school before curfew! Those three years of training made me a confident, strong, fearless, compassionate, resourceful woman, all with God's help and my mom's encouragement.

After graduation in 1959, I worked in Pediatrics at Mercy until 1969. I moved to Toledo and was Head Nurse of Pediatrics for 10 years at the Medical College of Ohio (MCO). Because we were a tertiary care unit, after 10 years, I took a position as Patient Care Coordinator in the General Internal Medicine Clinic, until I retired from there in 1996. Then as the Quality Review Nurse for Mercy Health System, I reviewed records and offices of many of the residents, both Peds and GIM, during my 25 years at MCO...a really fun job! I retired 5 years ago, at age 80, after a MARVELOUS career!

**Judy Miller Blochinger** Class of 1959

Just a note to let you know how excellent the training for the 1953-56 class was. I graduated in 1956. I had to take 2 buses to get Mercy from Clairton and working shifts was no picnic. In April 1957 I went to McKeesport Hospital. The Head Nurse was leaving in August (men's Medical Unit-26 bed ward). I was called to the Nursing Director's office (wondering what I did wrong). The Director said, "I would like you to replace the head nurse." I told her I couldn't because I enrolled in Duquesne and you have 4 of your McKeesport graduates working there. In essence, she told me she would pick who she wanted. After 3 calls down to her office, I accepted and went to Duquesne night school. Was Head Nurse of the men's medical unit until after my second daughter was born and I was pregnant with my third in 1963. Received many compliments from doctors during that time—all thanks to My Mercy Days. Sister Carolyn started with our class till she went to the nunnery—as she called it.

I just want you younger girls and boys to know Mercy always put out special nurses.

Thanks for keeping the Alumni going. At 88 I can't drive into the city for functions (would love to) but enjoy reading about our school & hospital. My sister, Concetta Thomas, her daughter, Sherlyn Thomas Lyons and sister-in-law, Mary Alexis Bonadio are all Mercy grads and my brother Dr. Pete Bonadio did a residency there.

P.S. Still have my cape if needed for the archives.



### How?

Assume responsibility for coordination and delegation of duties or choose a lead coordinator.

Pick an all-star group of classmates that will work well together.

Make planning a collaborative effort.

Choose delegation of duties based on skills, talents, availability and willingness to do the task.

Assign tasks with a timeline and due date.

Keep of list of things to do and review at each committee meeting.
